


Green Ideas

Heat Illness – What To Do

Would you know what to do if a co-worker was ill from the heat? The OSHA Quick Card on Protecting Workers from Heat Stress lists the following:

- Call a supervisor for help. If the supervisor is not available, call 911.
- Have someone stay with the worker until help arrives.
- Move the worker to a cooler/shaded area.
- Remove outer clothing.
- Fan and mist the worker with water; apply ice (ice bags or ice towels).
- Provide cool drinking water, if able to drink.

If the worker is not alert or seems confused, this may be a heat stroke. Call 911 immediately and apply ice as soon as possible.
